

Summary

Working gas in storage was 1,830 Bcf as of Friday, March 31, 2023, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net decrease of 23 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 443 Bcf higher than last year at this time and 298 Bcf above the five-year average of 1,532 Bcf. At 1,830 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.



Prices/Supply/Demand

- **Supply:** According to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights, the average total natural gas supply was unchanged from last week, averaging 105.0 Bcf/d. Dry natural gas production decreased by 0.4% (0.4 Bcf/d), and average net imports from Canada increased by 10.4% (0.4 Bcf/d) from last week.
- **Demand:** Total U.S. natural gas consumption fell by 7.1% (5.6 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week, according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights. Natural gas consumed in the residential and commercial sectors declined by 17.8% (4.9 Bcf/d) week over week. Natural gas consumed in the power generation sector declined by 0.4% (0.1 Bcf/d), and natural gas consumed in the industrial sector declined by 2.7% (0.6 Bcf/d). Natural gas exports to Mexico increased 0.5% and natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) averaged 13.9 Bcf/d, or 0.9 Bcf/d higher than last week.

North East Prices:

• In the Northeast, natural gas prices fell this week. At the Algonquin Citygate, which serves <u>Boston-area consumers</u>, the price went down 29 cents from \$3.26/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$2.97/MMBtu yesterday, bringing the price closer in line with other major hubs in the Northeast. Temperatures in the <u>Boston Area</u> averaged 38°F this report week, 9°F higher than last week, leading to 64 fewer HDDs than last week. In the <u>New York-Central Park Area</u>, temperatures averaged 43°F, which is 3°F higher than normal, resulting in 25 fewer HDDs than normal. Total consumption of natural gas in the Northeast decreased 7% (1.8 Bcf/d) week over week to an average of 22.9 Bcf/d, almost entirely driven by a 13% (1.7 Bcf/d) decrease in consumption in the residential and commercial sectors.

LNG

• **Pipeline receipts:** Overall weekly average natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export terminals increased by 6.9% (0.9 Bcf/d) week over week to average 13.9 Bcf/d this report week, according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights. Natural gas deliveries to terminals in South Louisiana increased by 3.2% (0.3 Bcf/d) to 8.4 Bcf/d, while deliveries to terminals in South Texas increased by 16.5% (0.6 Bcf/d) to 4.3 Bcf/d. Natural gas deliveries to terminals outside the Gulf Coast were essentially unchanged.

• **Vessels departing U.S. ports:** Twenty-eight LNG vessels (10 from Sabine Pass, 5 from Freeport, 4 each from Cameron and Corpus Christi, 3 from Calcasieu Pass, and 2 from Cove Point) with a combined LNG-carrying capacity of 105 Bcf departed the United States between March 30 and April 5, according to shipping data provided by Bloomberg Finance, L.P.



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

SAFETY CORNER

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Fire Resistant Clothing: What You Need To Know

When your work features significant fire hazards, you may need to wear fire resistant, or FR Clothing. However, not all FR gear is the same. FR Clothing is rated for its ability to resist catching fire when exposed to open flames, high temperatures, or electrical arc flashes. FR Clothing will also feature labeling that indicates the types of hazards it is designed to protect you from. Only garments that meet the NFPA 2112 standards for Fire Resistance or the NFPA 70E standards for Arc Flash Resistance may be used for these purposes. Occasionally, you may also encounter garments that are rated as "Self-Extinguishing". While these clothes may be marginally safer than unrated garments, it's important to understand that they do not meet the NFPA standards for fire resistance, and may not be used for FR purposes.

FR clothing needs to be properly handled to maintain its fire resistance. FR clothing should only be washed according to the directions indicated on its labeling. Washing FR clothing incorrectly, such as using fabric softener, can actually reduce or negate its ability to resist fire or dissipate electric arcs. Always clean FR clothing according to the manufacturer's instructions. It's also important to recognize when a garment needs replaced. If an FR garment becomes soaked in oil, for example, then it must be replaced. FR gear should also be checked for signs of damage, such as cuts, holes, or heavy wear. Like with being soaked in oil, cuts and holes compromise a garment's ability to protect its wearer, and must be replaced.

FR gear also needs to be worn correctly to protect workers. FR gear must be worn as the outermost layer of apparel, even in bad weather. All buttons and zippers on FR gear must be fastened and closed fully, with shirt tails fully tucked in to eliminate the possibility of flames traveling underneath FR gear and burning skin. Similarly, FR sleeves may not be rolled up, as doing so will expose your arms to fire hazards. Lastly, FR Gear may not be layered on top of synthetic, non FR under layers, such as polyester or nylon clothing.

Properly worn and maintained, FR and Arc Rated gear can protect your from serious injury by helping to dissipate extreme heat and electrical arc energy.

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
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

Bruce Tague brings decades of experience to the organization







The position his boys remember most was serving as Chairman of the Adult Advisory Board of the Hyde Park and Mt Lookout Teen Center (Cincinnati) where he helped bring in some of the top rock bands of the late 1960s. 
