

# Summary

Working gas in storage was 2,550 Bcf as of Friday, June 2, 2023, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net increase of 104 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 562 Bcf higher than last year at this time and 353 Bcf above the five-year average of 2,197 Bcf. At 2,550 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.total

## Prices/Supply/Demand

- Supply: According to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights, the average total supply of natural gas rose by 0.1% (0.1 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week. Dry natural gas production decreased by 0.6% (0.7 Bcf/d), and average net imports from Canada increased by 18.6% (0.8 Bcf/d) from last week as imports returned to levels seen before the wildfires in Western Canada disrupted natural gas flows.
- Demand: Total U.S. consumption of natural gas rose by 7.5% (4.7 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week, according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights. Natural gas consumed for power generation rose by 17.6% (5.4 Bcf/d) week over week. Industrial sector consumption decreased by 0.3% (0.1 Bcf/d), and residential and commercial sector consumption declined by 5.8% (0.6 Bcf/d). Natural gas exports to Mexico were essentially unchanged, and natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) averaged 11.9 Bcf/d, or 1.4 Bcf/d lower than last week.

#### Pricing:

The price of natural gas is a strong driver of the profitability of drilling in each region, and it helps determine whether the resources are classified as economically recoverable or uneconomical. Producer profitability and any resource classification are also based on natural gas production rates over time, geologic conditions and other factors affecting drilling, completion and production costs, and assumed future natural gas prices.

Henry Hub natural gas prices fell from a monthly average of \$8.81/MMBtu in August 2022 to \$2.15/MMBtu in May 2023 and averaged \$5.09/MMBtu during the past year (June 2022 through May 2023). We forecast the U.S. Henry Hub benchmark natural gas price will increase to average \$3.42/MMBtu in 2024, affecting the volume of natural gas that will be considered economic to drill for and produce in the Haynesville.

By changing the measure of profitability from a breakeven price to an internal rate of return, we can examine how much of the overall area of the Haynesville Formation contains a resource base that is profitable in any given natural gas price scenario. At \$2.00/MMBtu, no area can currently achieve a 10% internal rate of return, but at \$8.00/MMBtu, 72% of the total area could return a 10% internal rate of return. At \$4.00/MMBtu, only 13% of the area is profitable at a 10% internal rate of return, but an additional 72% would be marginally profitable with an internal rate of return ranging from 0%–10%.

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# Fire Resistant Clothing: What You Need To Know

When your work features significant fire hazards, you may need to wear fire resistant, or FR Clothing. However, not all FR gear is the same. FR Clothing is rated for its ability to resist catching fire when exposed to open flames, high temperatures, or electrical arc flashes. FR Clothing will also feature labeling that indicates the types of hazards it is designed to protect you from. Only garments that meet the NFPA 2112 standards for Fire Resistance or the NFPA 70E standards for Arc Flash Resistance may be used for these purposes. Occasionally, you may also encounter garments that are rated as "Self-Extinguishing". While these clothes may be marginally safer than unrated garments, it's important to understand that they do not meet the NFPA standards for fire resistance, and may not be used for FR purposes.

FR clothing needs to be properly handled to maintain its fire resistance. FR clothing should only be washed according to the directions indicated on its labeling. Washing FR clothing incorrectly, such as using fabric softener, can actually reduce or negate its ability to resist fire or dissipate electric arcs. Always clean FR clothing according to the manufacturer's instructions. It's also important to recognize when a garment needs replaced. If an FR garment becomes soaked in oil, for example, then it must be replaced. FR gear should also be checked for signs of damage, such as cuts, holes, or heavy wear. Like with being soaked in oil, cuts and holes compromise a garment's ability to protect its wearer, and must be replaced.

FR gear also needs to be worn correctly to protect workers. FR gear must be worn as the outermost layer of apparel, even in bad weather. All buttons and zippers on FR gear must be fastened and closed fully, with shirt tails fully tucked in to eliminate the possibility of flames traveling underneath FR gear and burning skin. Similarly, FR sleeves may not be rolled up, as doing so will expose your arms to fire hazards. Lastly, FR Gear may not be layered on top of synthetic, non FR under layers, such as polyester or nylon clothing.

Properly worn and maintained, FR and Arc Rated gear can protect your from serious injury by helping to dissipate extreme heat and electrical arc energy.

# 2023 SOOGA'S HALL OF FAME



SOOGA would like to take this time to tell you a little bit about our honoree Jim Javins that was inducted into the 2023 SOOGA Hall of Fame. Jim has been actively apart of SOOGA for over 20 years and is an incredible source of knowledge. He is the man behind the infamous Gas Reports showcased in the bi-monthly Insider. Jim graduated from Glenville State University with a degree in business, worked as a teacher and a financial consultant before entering the Oil and Gas business. Jim went to work in the Oil and Gas business in 1971 and has had a 50-year career in the drilling, production, pipeline, and marketing of natural gas in the Appalachian Basin. He started with

an independent producer in WV, then went on to Charleston, WV when it was sold to Ray Resources as a field office manager. Ray sold the company a few years later, and Jim went to work with an independent producer in Marietta for over a year until he got a job with Enron as a Senior Production Originator (Gas Purchaser). He purchased gas supply from local producers in the Appalachian Basin on 5 pipelines, 4 LDC's and 3 gathering systems. He has worked for 5 different marketing companies since 1990, all of which had offices in Ohio to maintain a local presence. He purchased from 25,000 to 50,000 dth/day during his career with the various energy companies. He has been actively involved with all of the Oil and Gas associations in the Basin, and having served on the Board of Trustees of the Ohio Oil and Gas Association, Kentucky Oil and Gas Association, and Southeastern Ohio Oil and Gas Association. He has held the position of Vice President of the Kentucky Association, President of the Southeastern Ohio Oil and Gas Association, and served on the commerce/gas committees of all seven state Associations. Jim's career has had him traveling the entire basin for many years, and he said he has made many friends in this business. Being actively involved in the Southeastern Oil and Gas Association has been like coming home for him, as he grew up about 35 miles from Marietta, and thus calls this area his home. # WHY AIR QUALITY IS IMPORTANT

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), in partnership with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), issues daily air quality forecast guidance as part of a national Air Quality Forecasting Capability. Air quality has improved significantly since the passage of the Clean Air Act in 1970; however, there are still many areas of the country where the public is exposed to unhealthy levels of air pollutants and sensitive ecosystems are damaged by air pollution. Poor air quality is responsible for an estimated more than 100,000 premature deaths in the United States each year. Costs from air pollution-related illness are estimated at \$150 billion per year. The goal of the U.S. air quality program is to provide ozone, particulate matter and other pollutant forecasts the public can use to limit the harmful effects of poor air quality. Our goal is to save and improve lives and reduce the number of air quality -related asthma attacks; eye, nose, and throat irritation; heart attacks and other respiratory and cardiovascular problems.

#### RISKS RELATED TO GROUND LEVEL OZONE

Ground-level ozone (O3) is a product of nitrogen oxides (NOx) and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) in the presence of heat and sunlight. Motor vehicle exhaust, industrial emissions, gasoline vapors, and chemical solvents are among the major sources of NOx and VOCs responsible for harmful buildup of ground-level ozone. Even at low concentrations, <u>ozone</u> can trigger a variety of health problems such as lung irritation and inflammation, asthma attacks, wheezing, coughing, and increased susceptibility to respiratory illnesses.

## RISKS RELATED TO PARTICULATE MATTER

Particulate matter (PM), or airborne particles, includes dust, dirt, soot, and smoke. Some particles are directly emitted into the air by cars, trucks, buses factories, construction sites and wood burning to name a few examples. Other particles are formed in the air when gases from burning fuels react with sunlight and water vapor. Such gases, from incomplete combustion in motor vehicles, at power plants and in other industrial processes, contribute indirectly to particulate pollution. This pollution can cause chronic bronchitis, asthma attacks, decreased lung function, coughing, painful breathing, cardiac problems and heart attacks, as well as a variety of serious environmental impacts such as acidification of lakes and streams and nutrient depletion in soils and water bodies.


