

Summary

Working gas in storage was 3,001 Bcf as of Friday, July 28, 2023, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net increase of 14 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 550 Bcf higher than last year at this time and 322 Bcf above the five-year average of 2,679 Bcf. At 3,001 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.

Prices/Supply/Demand

- Supply: According to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights, the average total supply of natural gas rose by 0.8% (0.9 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week. Dry natural gas production grew by 0.8% (0.8 Bcf/d) to average 102.5 Bcf/d this week, and average net imports from Canada increased by 1.2% (0.1 Bcf/d) from last week.
- Demand: Total U.S. consumption of natural gas rose by 0.9% (0.7 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week to average 76.6 Bcf/d, according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights. Natural gas consumed for power generation rose by 1.2% (0.5 Bcf/d) week over week. Industrial sector consumption decreased by 0.3% (0.1 Bcf/d), and residential and commercial sector consumption increased by 2.3% (0.2 Bcf/d). Natural gas exports to Mexico decreased by 2.6% (0.2 Bcf/d). Natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) averaged 12.2 Bcf/d, or 0.3 Bcf/d lower than last week.

Pricing:

- Henry Hub spot price: The Henry Hub spot price fell 18 cents from \$2.61 per million British thermal units (MMBtu) last Wednesday to \$2.43/MMBtu yesterday.
- Henry Hub futures prices: The August 2023 NYMEX contract expired Thursday at \$2.492/MMBtu, down 17 cents from last Wednesday. The September 2023 NYMEX contract price decreased to \$2.477/MMBtu, down 22 cents from last Wednesday to yesterday. The price of the 12-month strip averaging September 2023 through August 2024 futures contracts declined 16 cents to \$3.164/MMBtu.
- Select regional spot prices: Natural gas spot prices fell at most major pricing hubs
 this report week (Wednesday, July 26 to Wednesday, August 2). However, prices
 remained the same or rose at some locations in the Rockies and the West. Price
 changes this week ranged from a drop of \$4.75/MMBtu at Algonquin Citygate to an
 increase of \$0.16/MMBtu at Malin.
 - The price at the Waha Hub in West Texas, which is located near Permian Basin production activities, fell 19 cents this report week, from \$2.27/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$2.08/MMBtu yesterday. The Waha Hub traded 35 cents below the Henry Hub price yesterday, compared with last Wednesday when it traded 34 cents below the Henry Hub price. Prices were volatile in Texas this week, as pipeline maintenance disrupted natural gas flows from West Texas. Kinder Morgan declared a force majeure on the Permian Highway Pipeline on July 27 after an unspecified incident occurred and pipeline capacity was reduced to zero. The price at the Waha hub decreased to an intraweek low of -\$0.52/MMBtu on July 28.
 - In the Northeast, prices fell at major pricing hubs as average temperatures fell from recent highs and pipeline capacity increased slightly as a result of completed pipeline maintenance. In New England, at the Algonquin Citygate, which serves Boston-area consumers, the price fell \$4.75/MMBtu, from \$6.31/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$1.56/MMBtu yesterday. The operational capacity reductions on the Algonquin Gas Transmission system eased this week, according to a previously published notice. Temperatures across the region were lower this week, and consumption in the electric power sector declined by 2% (0.3 billion cubic feet per day [Bcf/d]), according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights. The Boston Area had 8 fewer cooling degree days (CDDs) this week compared with the previous week, totaling 64 CDDs this report week.







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Marietta Times: Letter to the Editor

Oil and gas boom has not fizzled; new industries will continue to be attracted to Shale Crescent region:

I am responding to the Marietta Times "Our Opinion" column published on Monday, Aug. 28 regarding the Ohio River Valley Institute's (ORVI) totally inaccurate conclusion that the oil and gas boom has fizzled. The readers' first tip that the report by ORVI may be biased against the oil and gas industry lies in their reference to the Shale Crescent region of Ohio, West Virginia and Pennsylvania as "Frackalachia." ORVI failed to use the most accurate data on oil and gas production that can be readily obtained from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources website (https://ohiodnr.gov/static/documents/oil-gas/resources/2021-O%26G-Annual.pdf). Similar websites are available in West Virginia and Pennsylvania where the oil and gas boom has not fizzled out.

If the Times editorial staff had done a little homework and checked with local experts or the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, which collects quarterly data on oil and gas production and publishes quarterly and annual summaries of this data, they would have observed that oil production increased from 4,974,000 barrels in 2012, to 18,999,000 barrels in 2021. Similarly, gas production increased from 86,700,000 Mcf in 2012 to 2,259,425,000 Mcf in 2021.

These numbers are down slightly from 2018, the peak year for oil and gas production, but one can hardly say the industry has fizzled out. With oil selling at \$60 to \$80 a barrel and gas selling for \$1.60 to \$3.40 per Mcf during this same period of time, it is easy to see how cash flow from production increased from under \$1 billion in 2012 to almost \$9 billion in 2021. With the landowners' royalty share of these numbers averaging around 18%, it is pretty clear that they, along with the companies and the State of Ohio, have benefitted significantly from the oil and gas boom in Ohio. Note that this information was obtained from the 2021 Annual Report. The 2022 Annual Report has not yet been loaded on the ODNR website.

The Capital Journal reported (based on the ORVI report) that gas production deteriorated since 2008 and growth has gone from meager gains in 2008 to an absolute decline. Nothing could be further from the truth. The fact that the Shale Crescent region is so richly blessed with an abundant supply of natural gas, new industries will continue to be attracted to the region where cheap energy abounds.

H2S - TOXIC GAS IN OIL & GAS DRILLING

Hydrogen Sulfide gas can be one of the most deadly hazards in the oil and gas industry. It is important that workers in the oil and gas industry are very aware of its lethal properties. Hydrogen sulfide is a highly toxic, colorless, combustible gas. It is heavier than air and has the unmistakable odor of rotten eggs. Loss of consciousness can occur within seconds when exposed to a high concentration of H2S gas. The correct way of determining the amount of H2S present is by testing for the gas. If H2S is suspected, the concentration must be determined before any persons are allowed in the area. If H2S gas is detected, the following procedures should be followed: The drilling rig must be equipped with H2S monitors, along with audible and visual alarms. A calibration must be performed daily or as instructed by the manufacturer. Wind direction indicators should be installed in locations that are visible from the rig floor, shale shakers, and mud tanks. At least one blower must be located on the rig floor; but blowers are also highly recommended at the shale shaker, mud tank and cellar floor. H2S warning signs must be located no more than ¼ mile from the well. At least two designated safe briefing areas with at least two sets of self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA's) must be located in each area. Emergency escape breathing units must be kept on the rig floor, monkey board, shale shaker and mud tank. All employees must have completed an H2S training program. Extra caution must be used around low lying areas such as cellars, ditches, etc. H2S is heavier than air and will collect in these areas. All personnel must avoid entering any confined space including: tanks, vessels, or other enclosed area unless they have received confined space entry training, they have a permit for entry when required, and the space has been tested and found safe for entry.
