

#### Summary

Working gas in storage was 3,719 Bcf as of Friday, December 1, 2023, according to EIA estimates. This represents a net decrease of 117 Bcf from the previous week. Stocks were 254 Bcf higher than last year at this time and 234 Bcf above the five-year average of 3,485 Bcf. At 3,719 Bcf, total working gas is within the five-year historical range.

#### Prices/Supply/Demand

- Supply: According to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights, the average total supply of natural gas fell by 0.5% (0.6 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week. Dry natural gas production decreased by 0.2% (0.2 Bcf/d) to a weekly average of 105.0 Bcf/d, and average net imports from Canada decreased by 5.9% (0.4 Bcf/d) from last week.
- Demand: Total U.S. consumption of natural gas fell by 9.4% (9.3 Bcf/d) compared with the previous report week, according to data from S&P Global Commodity Insights, as warmer temperatures across most of the Lower 48 states reduced demand for space heating. Natural gas consumed for power generation declined by 2.4% (0.8 Bcf/d) week over week, and industrial sector consumption decreased by 2.8% (0.7 Bcf/d). Residential and commercial sector consumption declined by 19.2% (7.8 Bcf/d). Natural gas exports to Mexico increased 5.6% (0.3 Bcf/d). Natural gas deliveries to U.S. LNG export facilities (LNG pipeline receipts) averaged 14.1 Bcf/d, or 0.2 Bcf/d lower than last week.

#### Pricing:

- Henry Hub spot price: The Henry Hub spot price rose 3 cents from \$2.70 per million British thermal units (MMBtu) last Wednesday to \$2.73/MMBtu yesterday.
- Henry Hub futures price: The price of the January 2024 NYMEX contract decreased 23.5 cents, from \$2.804/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$2.569/MMBtu yesterday. The price of the 12-month strip averaging January 2024 through December 2024 futures contracts declined 23.8 cents to \$2.746/MMBtu.
- Select regional spot prices: Natural gas spot prices fell at most locations this report week (Wednesday, November 29 to Wednesday, December 6).
   Price changes ranged from a decrease of \$2.34/MMBtu at the Opal hub to an increase of \$6.30/MMBtu at the Algonquin Citygate.
  - Prices at most major hubs in the Northeast rose this report week. At the Algonquin Citygate, which serves Boston-area consumers, the price rose \$6.30 from \$3.50/MMBtu last Wednesday to \$9.80/MMBtu yesterday. Temperatures in the <u>Boston Area</u> averaged 41°F this report week, resulting in 13 fewer heating degree days (HDDs) than normal for the week, but temperatures dropped below normal on Tuesday and Wednesday which increased demand for natural gas for space heating at the end of the report week. Spot prices at the Algonquin Citygate hub rose to an intraweek high of \$13.13/MMBtu on Tuesday with lower temperatures toward the end of the report week. In response to rapidly rising demand the Algonquin Gas Transmission pipeline issued an operational flow order on Tuesday, calling on shippers to ensure "that actual deliveries of gas out of the system must be equal to or less than scheduled deliveries." In addition, since October 20, the Millstone nuclear power station in Waterford, Connecticut, has been operating at approximately 40% of capacity, which is contributing to increased natural gas consumption for electric power generation to make up for lower nuclear power-generation capacity.

# **US EPA Methane Rule & US EPA Methane Tax**

#### US EPA Methane Rule

You may or may not have heard but the US EPA recently announced the final version of the Methane Rule. It will soon be posted to the Federal Register at which time the Ohio EPA will have 24 months to create a statewide methane rule as strict or more strict than the US EPA rule. Oil and gas operators will then have an additional 36 months to comply with the Ohio EPA Methane Rule. Once the rule is in the federal register, legal challenges are likely to follow.

The important thing to know about the Methane Rule, barring any successful legal challenges, compliance with this rule will be required. SOOGA is working with other oil and gas associations to combat this proposed rule and will keep you updated as this moves forward.

#### US EPA Methane Tax

The methane tax is based on calculations taken from Subpart W of the current Clean Air Act regulations. The calculation is based on the potential to emit methane and not actual methane emissions. With this calculation being based on component parts (fittings, valves, controllers, etc.), it could be argued it is a personal property tax. Other industries emit methane and are not subject to a methane tax, so it could also be argued that the methane tax is a discriminatory tax.

SOOGA is working with other oil and gas associations to clarify these items in an effort to combat this onerous tax.

The timing of the US EPA Methane Tax is more imminent. Barring any successful legal challenges, the Methane Tax is set to take effect in the spring of 2025. SOOGA will keep you updated as this moves forward.

# Dos and Don'ts to Avoid Carbon Monoxide Poisoning While Using a Portable Generator

How can employers protect employees from the dangers of carbon monoxide?

Portable generators are helpful in numerous environments, including rural worksites, construction projects and during winter months, when companies may experience power outages. But when workers find themselves needing to use a portable generator, there are precautions they and their employers should take to avoid illness or injury, especially when it comes to carbon monoxide.

From 2011 to 2021, 770 people died from carbon monoxide incidents involving generators, averaging out to about 77 per year, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission reported.

So what steps can be taken to keep employees safe?

**Do consider ventilation**. Give the <u>portable generator</u> about three to four feet of clear space on all sides.

**Do use monitors**. Personal carbon monoxide monitors can be helpful for each employee. Employers can also install <u>carbon monoxide alarms</u> throughout buildings.

**Don't operate a generator inside**. Keep portable generators outside. They should also be a minimum of 20 feet away from any <u>entry point</u> leading to an inside space (like a window).

**Don't skimp on education**. Employees should know the hazards associated with portable generator use, the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning and what to do if they are exposed, <u>OSHA</u> said. Symptoms of potential poisoning include a headache, dizziness, nausea, confusion, chest pain and passing out, per the <u>CDC</u>.


